A note from the Superintendent Minister

Autumn 2022

Dear all,

“All Change Please!”

This is often the announcement you hear at a train station when the train arrives at its destination. Occasionally in the Methodist Church it does seem like all things change and this Connexional year has that feel to it. Harvest is one of my favourite periods in the church calendar, when we celebrate the gathering of the crops and have fantastic harvest meals (or we used to pre covid). I hope they can return this year, but as we ‘bring in the sheaves’ let us once again ponder the situation we are facing both in our churches and in our world.



As I write this, we are experiencing an unprecedented heat wave and once again, the media and social media are decrying fake news. If we are to halt the damage to our planet, we all need to make changes and the consequences of not doing so means these heatwaves, and worse, will continue to blight us. Recently, the Methodist Conference was held and has rightly and boldly agreed that the entire Church will be net zero by 2030. A real challenge for us as Christians, churches, and as a Circuit. It was the late Mr. Rex Hallett, that encouraged the installation of solar panels on our manses and churches when I arrived in the circuit, but how many churches have taken up that challenge? We need more climate change prophets like dear Rex, to remind us that we need to act now and be proactive to preserve God’s creation for the generations to come.

A further challenging topic was that of ongoing mission and ministry. Please do read the Methodist Conference digest which has been published and details important developments on how things are emerging Connexionally about the future. At Circuit level we are continuing conversations following on from the Mission Strategy position we agreed at the March Circuit Meeting, about this concept of ‘partnership in the gospel’ to further embed our circuit mission strategy and how by working together we can impact our communities in fresh ways. Please speak to your Church Council reps to see how things are progressing in your church. It is hoped that by the December Circuit Meeting a report of the outcomes of these conversations as well as an update on how the stationing process is progressing, will be presented.

At the onset of the new Methodist year, we offer our congratulations to the Revd. Julie King who was received into full Connexion and ordained at the Conference in Telford in June, a splendid day of uplifting and encouraging services, do watch them online if you haven’t seen them already. This Connexional Year marks my final year in the Circuit after 8 years. This year we will also say goodbye to the Revd. Steve Poole as he seeks permission to ‘sit down’ or retire early, in 2023. We welcome back to the Circuit Office, Mrs Laura Pottage after the birth of our son, Alfred. We say thank you and goodbye to Mrs Prima Mendonca for the work she has given to the circuit at the Lighthouse over the last few years and extend Mr David Mercer’s stay to replace Prima after covering for Laura. We also say welcome to Mr Colm Foley, our new Circuit Property Manager who replaces Anthony, who left us in January. So, another new Connexional year with lots of changes but we give thanks as always for the faithfulness of God, whose love and enduring grace always prevail.

As I close, I am reminded of the song in *Singing the Faith* 473, ‘so every day, we’re on our way, for we’re a travelling, wandering race, we’re the People of God.’ As Methodists, that is always true!

What were your childhood aspirations?

Enjoy life, which is harder than expected sometimes.

What did you do before coming to work in the Circuit?

I graduated from Secondary School and am now studying at the University of Life.

What do you get up to in your spare time

Outside of socialising with friends, consuming media, and gaming, a lot of my spare time is devoted to volunteering with the youth groups I was a part of growing up – the RAF Air Cadets and The Boys' Brigade. While working with young adults can be challenging at times, the experiences I gain as a staff member and the opportunity to help shape the next generation, are priceless.

You are a Circuit Admin Assistant- is there anything you would like to share about that?

After just over a year of working in the Circuit Office, I can confidently say that working for the church certainly is a unique experience.



“I DON’T DO GOD, BUT I MAKE A DEMON CHOCOLATE CAKE!!!”

These words will stay with me forever ... Yes, I uttered these words about 15 years ago, during an interview for a job at a local church project in Knutsford, Cheshire. Eleven words that I am frequently reminded of, if not by the people who interviewed me then every-day when I think how God has worked in my life.



I never went to church apart from the usual weddings and funerals and the only ‘faith based’ input I had was during the R.E. lessons at junior school. Although, during my life I have always lived about 3 doors down from a church building – I am not sure if God was trying to give me a big hint but I never took that hint. After I left school, I wanted to go into teaching but unless I wanted to ‘stay on’ to retake my ‘O’ Levels I didn’t stand much of a chance. So, after leaving school I had a few different jobs including dental nursing and office work. But at the age of 20 I seemed to find my place working in the hospitality industry – for many years I had a lifestyle that consisted of being out every night drinking and generally having a ‘good time’. I woke up many mornings not being able to remember what had happened the previous evening – believe me, I didn’t feel good about myself. After many boyfriends I thought I had found the ‘one’ and I got married in 1988. Although this marriage didn’t last, I was blessed with four beautiful children. In the early 2000’s after an acrimonious divorce, I felt I needed a new start, so I moved to Knutsford from my home-town of Stockport. Little did I know what was in store for me and how my life would change

Starting work at ‘The Welcome’ (where I uttered those famous words) as a Kitchen Supervisor is where my journey to faith truly began. Debbie, who was the The Welcome’s manager was training to be a Deacon in the Methodist Church and Richard, the minister with pastoral responsibility showed me so much about Jesus’ love. Even when I shared my history, they didn’t judge, they listened and cared for me. I started asking questions about their faith and we had many discussions about many things. One of my duties was to prepare a meal once a month when there was a church service. With some of the locals from the estate we sat and shared food, sang hymns and listened to a sermon. I was fascinated by this ‘fresh expression’ of Church, it was relaxed and not like anything I had seen. One particular Sunday I heard the story from John’s Gospel about the woman at the well – it really was a revelation to me. This story could have been my story and I really needed to know more. It was at this point that I knew Jesus loved me, God forgave me for everything in my past.

I haven’t got the space here to describe how I felt and how many times I saw Jesus at work in that place, in my life and in other’s lives, too. Many things happened that were God incidents

in my life – but one which is very relevant happened on a Thursday afternoon.

It isn't that I have a really good memory, that I can say for definite it was a Thursday afternoon it is because the Welcome used to run a 'Sunday School on a Thursday afternoon' called Little Stars and I used to help with this (which wasn't one of my duties as Kitchen Supervisor). I mentioned earlier that I wanted to teach and on this particular afternoon I was setting up for this session and I distinctly heard a voice say "you are teaching now, go and tell my story!" I looked round and there was nobody in the building. I knew it was God. OK many people could say that it was my own thoughts but if you couple that with many people from the Church, who knew nothing about what had happened that afternoon, asking me if I had thought about becoming a Local Preacher. It seemed like I didn't have an option!!

I was told to speak to the Superintendent of the Circuit after discussing everything with Debbie and Richard. So, I found myself sat in the vestry at Knutsford Methodist Church talking to him and then he uttered the words: "I believe you are being called and I will give you a note to preach. Come to the next Local Preacher's meeting, where you may become a Local Preacher on trial!!!"

Woody Allen once paraphrased an old Yiddish proverb as "if you want to make God laugh, tell him your plans." Well, I told God my plans didn't include going any further than Local Preacher – He must have a really good sense of humour Once again, in my prayer times and many people asking me if I was going to Candidate in the Methodist church, I found myself on this path. The discernment process is obviously a wonderful if difficult time. But throughout that time I always knew I would candidate for Presbyteral ministry – which allows me to preside at the Lord's Table and feed people that meal that is representative. After many years of working and studying, which doesn't come naturally to me, God has held me and surrounded me with people who have nurtured me on my journey to Ordination.

As I reflect now on my journey, I realise that alongside the people that have helped me, taught me, nurtured me it is the Holy Spirit that has empowered me. I couldn't have done any of this without that. God has been good to me, and I thank Him everyday for the guidance, his Son Jesus and I try to use the gift of hospitality to show others the same love. My journey, like everyone else's, hasn't been easy but as I go forwards from Ordination, I know that God will be there with me and because of that I feel the peace that surpasses all understanding on a daily basis.

This is just a snapshot of my journey, so far. But I can say with confidence that I now do God BUT I still need to make that chocolate cake!!!!

Hayes End Methodist Church

a love of God and a heart for the community



Hayes End Methodist Church is on the Uxbridge Road not far from Hayes Police Station. Thousands of cars travel past it every day, but how many drivers know the church is there?

Methodism has been in Hayes End since 1891 when Ben Cox and his wife arrived from Kilburn. They attended Uxbridge Wesleyan Church, but on Sunday afternoons he delivered copies of Joyful News around the area to spread the good news of the saving love of God. He made contact with a local policeman and his wife, and the four met for prayer and discussion at the Cox's home, 'Springfield House'.

In just 3 years the gathering had increased to 40 and outgrew the home. Local Baptists had moved out of their corrugated-roofed chapel in Morgan's Lane, so the Methodists first rented and then purchased the building.

The congregation continued to grow and eventually plans were made for somewhere larger. Members decided they didn't want a large 'central hall' type of building, but rather something more modest. In 1929, negotiations began to build a church on a 'green field' plot at its present site. Fundraising began in earnest and three years later work started. The church was opened on 21 November 1934, and the following Sunday the congregation processed from Morgan's Lane to the new church as an act of witness, moving from the 'old' to the 'new'. The building had cost £9,125 and was built within 5 months.

Members of the church have always had a love of God and during the Second World War the building became a heart for the community. In 1941 the local authorities took over part of the building as a Rest Centre, with surrounding land used as allotments. After the war as life began to return to normality, a Boys' Brigade Company formed to work alongside the existing Girls' Brigade. This started a long tradition of youth work within the church. Unfortunately, the Girl's Brigade company closed last year but this summer the Boys' Brigade celebrated

a belated 75th birthday at a special open evening attended by the mayor and local MP, John McDonnell.

As with many churches, Hayes End has had its peaks and troughs, but a determination to worship and witness has always prevailed. In recent decades work has been done to modernise the worship area and the front of the church. And plans are afoot to improve other facilities to support and serve the local community.



But the church is always more than bricks and mortar. Its strength is its people and their faith – today we are a multi-cultural congregation drawn from many different countries and continents who have found their spiritual home at Hayes End. Worship is drawn from various traditions, and the church seeks to connect the good news of Jesus to life today, just as Ben Cox did over 130 years ago.

Despite the Covid pandemic, we continue to welcome newcomers to the church. And in June the church was filled with the laughter of children and the conversation of adults as the local community came today to celebrate the Platinum Jubilee. And the congregation of the Methodist Gujarati Fellowship have started meeting monthly as part of the church family.



Travelling along the Uxbridge Road at night, it is easier to spot the church as its lit cross shines out into the dark – a beacon of light to all. We are not a church of yesterdays - we continue to look forward in confidence to what God has in store. We remember with thankfulness those who have gone before, and trust that with their example, the blessing of our Lord Jesus Christ and the power of the Holy Spirit we can continue to share God's love for all who we meet.
